SMART Marine Institute Research Vessel Bursaries are unrivalled opportunities to gain offshore experience, learn, network and be mentored by established marine scientists and researchers.

Bursaries are paid €95/diem and Continuous Professional Development (CPD) is recognised by enrolling in and completed the accredited postgraduate module *Marine Research Vessel Data Collection and Surveying*.

Most of the application form is self-explanatory. This document offers advice on the important elements of the application process.

Personal Statement

Question 9 of the application form: *Please outline how you would benefit from participating in your preferred survey or surveys.*

This is your opportunity to present your motivation for joining a survey and relate that to the aims of the survey. Specify what you want to learn on the survey and how that learning will help you develop as a marine scientist. You can cite skills that are survey specific, and skills that are practiced on most surveys. A specific example might be that you would like to learn to ID demersal fish species, a general example might be you want to learn about CTD operations. Read the survey reports to identify the skills you want to learn.

Survey personnel are a community. Joining a survey is an opportunity to learn from, be mentored by and network with a community of individuals who are experts in their fields. That should be part of your motivation to join the survey. It's certainly a major opportunity.

What can you bring to the survey? Learners are integrated into the survey work programme and make an important contribution to achieving the survey aims. It's an active role so think about how your experience has prepared you for it. You don't have the depth of experience the scientific crew has but you have a degree, a masters degree or are studying for a PhD. Reflect on modules, projects, field trips and work experiences and relate these to the survey/surveys you are applying for. Not everything is relatable but there are aspects of your experience that are.

Surveys achieve their goals because the people on the vessel understand their roles and how to execute them. A research vessel is a confined space that demands professional conduct from all the people aboard to complete the survey tasks. RV professional conduct is respecting other's personal space, being courteous and being available. Learner testimony indicates that the bursary experience is a fantastic learning and networking experience. What personal experience do you have that will allow to take advantage of this opportunity?

You can write about all these things in your personal statement. Doing it well is a reflective exercise that makes a strong impression on evaluators and equips with a template that can be adapted to other applications. There are always other applications!

If your application is successful you will be asked to enrol in the accredited module, *Marine Research Vessel Data Collection and Surveying*. Completing the module recognises the Continuous Professional Development (CPD) you achieved. The module learning objectives can be a guide to writing your personal statement.















- 1. Critically evaluate the rationale for offshore research in the context of policy and advice formulation.
- 2.Demonstrate a comprehensive and transferrable overview of the research vessel operations and their applications to multidisciplinary offshore marine research.
- 3. Articulate an in depth understanding of the survey components, their interrelationships and integration within the overall survey plan.
- 4. Practice the interpersonal skills for professional conduct on board research vessels.
- 5.Demonstrate expertise in data acquisition and analysis and reporting relevant to the specific survey.

Surveys fall into four categories, groundfish (IAMS and IGFS), acoustic (WESPAS & CSHAS) and UWTV surveys. They are all fisheries surveys but operations on each are distinctive. If you're interest extends to all there is nothing to stop you submitting a separate application for each.

How many words?

Aim for 300 words or three paragraphs. The challenge is to be concise and comprehensive.

Curriculum Vitae

There are a lot of resources on how to structure CVs. Ensure yours is well structured and that the information is clearly and concisely presented. Your CV should support your personal statement. Or another way of putting that is that your personal statement is an opportunity to contextualise the achievements catalogued in your CV.

It's essential that your CV presents your academic achievements and work experience. If you have completed modules, assignments and projects that relate to the work of the survey itemise them in your CV. Likewise for work placements that formed part of your education and for work experience you undertook outside of your education.

Science we hope serves the societies that fund it, but the practice of science isn't just about universities and institutes. Citizen or community-based science initiatives are maybe just as important. Being able to cite involvement with these demonstrates a commitment to the marine beyond your choice of degree programme and this can set your CV and application apart. Its understood that working your way through university may not allow the time to volunteer with Coast Watch or Sea Search for example, but your university probably has marine or environmental societies that work to the same goals. Extra-curricular activities are an important element of CVs when they indicate dedication and skills beyond the confines of your academic programme.

Letter or recommendation

This is uploaded on the application form and the last element in the combined PDF. The person who writes this ideally is your champion and their letter will strongly endorse your motivation, skills, and experience. Moreover, they should also testify to the personal qualities which mark you as well placed to make an important contribution to the survey goals. This is the part of the application you have the least control over and yet in some ways it's the most important because it underpins your personal statement and CV so getting the right person is paramount. So, who is the best person? I would say somebody who wants to see you succeed because they have seen your potential and have worked with you in supervising a research project, thesis, or has direct experience of your abilities in fieldwork. The point here is someone who has direct experience of you and sees your potential.















Previous seagoing experience

Previous seagoing experience is not a prerequisite, but it does help us to gauge the candidate's level of offshore experience and engagement with the marine environment. If you have been on RV surveys before, including Celtic Voyager training surveys, input it here. Also sailing, powerboat, or even ferries. Let us know.

Necessary Certification

Medical

An ENG-11 Medical Certificate (ENG 2 from UK) is required for all scientific crew on Irish research vessels. These are valid for two years from date of issue. Annex A is a list of medical practices in Ireland approved for ENG 11 certification.

Personal Survival Techniques Certification (PST)

The required Personal Survival Techniques (PST) training is approved under the STCW 78/95 convention and is mandatory for scientific crew on Irish Research vessels. Training certificates are valid for five years from date of issue. At present we are aware of three training providers whose certificates are accepted by the vessel operators.

These are:

- 1. The National Maritime College of Ireland in Cork <u>Personal Survival Techniques (PST) STCW-95 National Maritime College of Ireland (nmci.ie)</u>
- 2. Seamanship Centre run courses every month at Ballyshannon. <u>The Seamanship Centre</u> (stcwdirect.com)
- 3. The National Fisheries College of Ireland, Greencastle. <u>BIM STCW Personal Survival Techniques</u>

Please note PST courses take a full day to complete and course availability is limited.

Evaluation and shortlisting

The application form and the attached CV and Letter of Recommendation are collated in a single PDF. Applications are then assessed equally on the statement of motivation, CV and letter of recommendation. Applications from the highest scoring candidates are then forwarded to the survey chief scientists. If they agree with the assessment, the applicant or applicants are invited to the survey.

What if you haven't been shortlisted?

It's a competitive process so it goes without saying that most applicants are not forwarded to the Chief Scientist. If you haven't been offered a place on the survey, seek feedback on your application and apply again.

Other reasons for not being shortlisted

Ideally chief scientists want to complete survey staffing at least a month before embarkation. Because of this, applications that include valid Personal Survival Techniques (PST) and ENG 11 medical certification are weighted above those without. ENG 11's can be arranged at relatively short notice PST less so.















If I keep applying will I eventually succeed?

Keep applying. Persistence pays. Ask for feedback and use that to tune your next application. Commitment and persistence are the most important factors in driving your marine science career.

Any other advice

Don't leave getting your letter of recommendation to the last minute. Letters of recommendation are important documents so give your supervisor every chance to do their best for you. Also, if for some reason they are unavailable you need to find out early so you have time to find another sponsor.

Save your application materials in a dedicated folder. Write and hone text responses in a word document and copy and paste into the box. These are materials you can recycle and repurpose.

Use the available time to build the best application you can. A hastily assembled application submitted well ahead of time more often than not loses out to a well-crafted application submitted on the last day.

Pay attention to detail e.g., upload attachments in the format requested, PDF for CV and letter of recommendation. Make sure your personal details are correct and input dates of certificates correctly. All of this comes under the heading of not putting assessors to extra work.

There are also other schemes which you can redirect your application to. One of these is the Foreign Research Vessel observer scheme at the Marine Institute (<u>Foreign Vessel Observer Scheme | Marine Institute</u>).

Find out if your department or school has applied for shiptime and ask to be included. If you're very brave ask chief scientists from other universities if they have a place on their survey. Write them an email with the materials you've developed.

Network with researchers in your institute and look for opportunities to help them with field or lab work. This is part of demonstrating commitment and interest.

Persist!

Why bursaries?

Developing your experience and skills builds the capacity for the data collection and research needed for the responsible stewardship of the ocean. A strong application demonstrates that you are well placed to join the community of marine scientists charged with this fundamental obligation.















FAQs

1. Who can apply?

A: Undergraduate, postgraduate students, early-stage post-docs and marine oriented practitioners seeking CPD. All applications are evaluated.

2. Do I have to be a current student or affiliated to a university?

A: Most applications come from current undergraduates, postgraduates, and recent graduates. By recent, within four years of graduation.

3. Do graduates or postgraduates have an advantage over undergraduates?

A: Final year undergraduates are treated as graduates and are awarded bursaries. 1st to 3rd years can and do apply but academic, placement and work experience often falls short. In any case if you think this is an important opportunity submit an application.

4. Do you have to be from Ireland to apply?

A: All applications are accepted. The vast majority of awards are to applications from HEIs in Ireland (north and south). UK applicants are also successful. European and further afield less so. Logistics are difficult to resolve with short run-in time to survey.

5. Is there a limit to how many applications I can submit?

A: You can apply as many times as you like within reason. Your last application is the one that's evaluated.
